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behler discusses the current state of thought on modernity and postmodernity detailing the intellectual problems to be faced and examining the positions of such central figures in the debate as lyotard habermas rorty and derrida he finds that beyond the limits of communication further discussion must be carried out through irony the historical rise of the concept of modernity is examined through discussions of the querelle des anciens et des modernes as a break with classical tradition and on the theoretical writings of de stael the english romantics and the great german romantics schlegel hegel and nietzsche the growth of the concept of irony from a formal rhetorical term to a mode of indirectness that comes to characterize thought and discourse generally is then examined from plato and socrates to nietzsche who

avoided the term irony but used it in his central concept of the mask

and replications or symbolic linking in social practice values history and heritage politics this book takes a closer look at tradition and folklore in order to conceptualize them within discourses on modernity and modernism the first section discusses modern and traditional as modern concepts and the study of folklore as a modern trajectory the underlying tenet here is that non modernity cannot be represented without modern mediation which therefore makes the representations of non modernity epistemologically modern the second section focuses on the nation state of finland and the nationalistic use of folk traditions in the discursive production of finnish modernity and its others the insights are applicable worldwide in discussions on cultural representation

discourse in late modernity sets out to show that critical discourse analysis is strongly positioned to address empirical research and theory building across the social sciences particularly research and theory on the semiotic linguistic aspects of the social world it situates critical discourse analysis as a form of critical social research in relation to diverse theories from the philosophy of science to social theory and from political science to sociology and linguistics first the authors clarify the ontological and epistemological assumptions of critical discourse analysis its view of what the social world consists of and how to study it and in so doing point to the connections between critical discourse analysis and critical social scientific research more generally secondly they relate critical discourse analysis to social theory by creating a research agenda in contemporary social life on the basis of narratives of late modernity particularly those of giddens habermas and harvey as well as feminist and postmodernist approaches thirdly they show the relevance of sociological work in the analysis of discursive aspects of social life drawing on the work of bourdieu and bernstein to theorise the dialectic of social reproduction and change and on post structuralist post colonial and feminist work to theorise the dialectic of complexity and homogenisation in contemporary societies finally they discuss the relationship between systemic functional linguistics and critical discourse analysis showing how the analytical strength of each can benefit from the other sets out a new and distinctive theoretical grounding and research agenda for critical discourse analysis interdisciplinary in scope draws on a broad range of theories and approaches

in three exemplary essays author peter bornedal promotes deconstruction as a cogent analytical method whose distinctive critical object is foundational knowledge in this he wants to restore deconstruction as a rational discourse while continuing to emphasize it as a critique of metaphysics two of the essays discuss the works of paul grice and jürgen habermas and their theories on language and communication in these essays the author demonstrates that despite the attempts of grice and habermas to give ontological foundations for inherent communicative rationality their endeavors are unsuccessful the third essay discusses john stuart mill s utilitarianism and argues that mill s attempts to decide what is in principle good remain futile and incomplete ultimately bornedal argues that we cannot give metaphysical reasons for rationality or the good life we can only decide to pursue these ideals but there is nothing beyond the decision that makes the pursuit necessary or inherent according to this position deconstruction becomes a kind of pragmatism or as the author states by way of paradox analytic deconstruction gives pragmatism a scientific foundation
